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The 'Serpent Motif' is known to all cultures and civilizations. From the primitive cultures to the so-called sophisticated civilizations, throughout history, almost every ethnic group has used serpent motifs in one way or another.

This is one motif which has influenced every form of knowledge and creativity such as philosophy, poetry, performing arts, paintings, sculptures, murals, bas reliefs, decoration, ornaments and other handicrafts, and so on. Snake/serpent motifs are part of Greek mythology, the Mayan Culture, the Hindu mythology and almost every religion. In Hindu mythology serpents/nagas with one head to 1001 heads are worshipped.

In the folklore and ballads of the west coast there are many references to the snakes. There are many exclusive shrines dedicated to serpents/nagas in the west coast. Nagamandala and "Pampin Tullal" are the artistic expressions in which plastic arts and performing arts combine with spiritual commitments.
